"I-Maxx Exchange's premium laminate flooring can be perfectly tailored to any homeowner's lifestyle and tastes." Its quality construction remains consistent to top notch standards and resistant to damages. To ensure long lasting life for your laminate floors, simply follow these steps on how to maintain and take care of your new laminate flooring.

How to Upkeep Your Laminate Floors

- ✓ Vacuum and dust mop your laminate floor before mopping.
 - It is recommended to repeat this step 2-3 days a week to remove unwanted debris on the floor.
- ✓ Mop your laminate floor with water.
 - It is recommended to repeat this step 2-3 days a week to prevent stickiness and odor remaining on the floor.
- ✓ Dry your laminate floor after mopping.
 - This can be done in several ways depending on how wet the floors are after mopping. It is highly recommended to open your windows and turn on a fan.
- ✓ Dry excessive water blots with a dry cloth or paper towel.
 - Never allow excess liquid to remain on your floor.
- ✓ Use acetone and/or water to remove oil stains and dirt marks.
 - Water is sufficient; however, acetone can help remove the bacteria.
- ✓ Attach adhesive felt protector pads underneath chair and table legs to prevent minor scratches.
- ✓ Do not use any sort of "clean and shine" products on your laminate floor.
 - Doing so will cause the opposite.

Care, Maintenance, and Information

I-Maxx Exchange premium laminate flooring continues to meet and exceed the standard laminate floors. Although it is highly resistant to stains and scratches, your premium laminate flooring are not 100% stain and scratch proof.

I-Maxx Exchange premium laminate floors are "waxed on all 4 sides," which means the planks are waxed all around on the previously exposed wood where the planks can click together. This coating of wax prevents the flooring from suffering severe water damage. However, this does not make the laminate flooring "water proof" like vinyl flooring.

Laminate floors can be damaged by water on exposed sides, which means if an installer cuts a piece to make it fit towards the end of the wall (such as the piece of laminate that goes under baseboard molding) it is more prone to water damage. This is true for most types of flooring. The only type of flooring that can withstand water even longer would be vinyl; however, vinyl is more prone to being scratched while laminate flooring is not.

IMPORTANT!

It is suggested to carefully mop and dry the edges of laminate floors where the laminates meet the baseboard and wall.
